Your IMB missionaries continue to serve faithfully around the globe even during these uniquely challenging times. Thank you for continuing to pray for them, and please know that we are praying for you as you serve others in your community.

All IMB missionaries live in their host countries on visas provided by that country. Some periodically leave the country in order to renew their visa. COVID–19 has presented us with a unique challenge. The challenge is that several missionary families will soon need to leave their host country to renew their visas and will not be able to return for an undetermined period because the host country has closed its borders to incoming travel. The decision has been made that these families will wait out this situation in the US and renew their necessary visas here, with the goal of returning to their host country at the earliest possible time. These missionaries will need housing in the US.

This has been an unusual month for you, us and the rest of the world. As in most countries, Germany entered into a semi-quarantine in order to contain the outbreak of Coronavirus. Schools, sports clubs, theaters, restaurants, bars, and play grounds remain closed. We leave the house for necessary errands such as going to the grocery store. Thankfully, the government still allows us to take daily walks as a family, while maintaining social distance

It has, however, been difficult to serve our neighborhood and maintain contact with new friends and neighbors. We make ourselves available, send emails and texts and arrange Skype conversations. Even though we enjoy precious time together as a family, we also feel restless. Most of our friends feel boredom or frustration, others express anxiety and fear.

Requests:

- H&C work among our people in London. Her mother lives in Dadeville and is being treated for C-19. Please pray that she recovers quickly and that her husband doesn't catch it as he has quite serious asthma.
- One of our workers in country who's father passed away a couple of months ago has had his Aunt pass away from C-19 today. He is in lockdown with his family, none of who are believers, and is really feeling the isolation from other believers.

Victories:

- The Congregation we are working with in country has been able to move their small groups and the main worship service to Zoom meetings. It has been received well and has a great participation. It is amazing to see how much the fellowship means to them even when it has to be virtual.
- In addition I am praying about starting a series on the Tabernacle as a recorded message that I have been trying to get to for years.
- Our team in France has said that they are even busier at home that they normally are because so many are now ready to talk. Their appointment calendar is full as they meet online continually in small groups and with individuals.
- In the south part of our country, our worker there has found that he is having great conversations with a number of neighbors (at a safe distance). One of his neighbors was a bit frightened until he saw him, thinking that if he was gone then the rapture must have occurred... (this is not a common reaction for our people). Our worker says that now this neighbor is ready for more serious conversations about Jesus.

D&D are in Central Asia. Their country was hit very hard with Coronavirus and he suffered respiratory issues, and one of them has been sick for about a week or so. They recently arrived on the field, and their team leaders were not permitted to travel to them. So D & D who have only been on the field a few months are all alone, and he is sick. Please pray especially for their family, and also for their team leaders.

We have one couple are serving in east Asia, and have been on lockdown since the first of Jan. They are fine, but both are teachers, and have not been able to teach since Jan.

We have 7 families in North Africa, and all of them are fine, but all on lockdown, and worried about their families in Latin America.

We have 9 families in Central Asia and they are all on lockdown during this crisis. Some have their children studying here in the U.S. and now have had to move out of the university. Many of these families or individuals are doctors and work in hospitals, and continue to work, and are continuously exposed to the virus. Please pray for them.

Also pray for our daughter son in law, and our grandson who are serving in Southeast Asia. They, like the others, have made the decision to stay where they are and continue to minister to the local people.
